The week began with industry certification training and testing, followed by content specific sessions and technology training. The highlight of the conference was the closing awards luncheon. VBEA Conference Overview

Fairfax, Virginia was the site of the 2006 Summer Conference, held July 31 through August 3. 297 Virginia Business educators came together to ***Bring Business & Information Technology into Focus.***

Virginia Department of Education provided pre-conference academies and workshops including MOS, IC3, and Dreamweaver certification training and testing; Voice and Handwriting Recognition; Project Based Learning; and Personal Digital Assistant training on the beginning and advanced level. Each of the 8 sessions were filled to capacity with Business teachers wanting to expand their knowledge and achieve certification. VBEA is grateful to Anne Rowe, Judith Sams, and the Virginia Department of Education for organizing and providing this opportunity.

Keynote speaker, Hugh Goldthorpe, inspired VBEA members and guests at the opening lunch session on the topic of ***Achieving Excellence***, and followed after lunch with a session, ***Dinosaurs are Just That!*** which challenged the audience to see things differently...and informed us that, yes, sometimes success is one of our enemies.

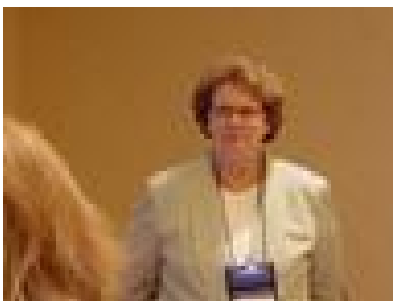

Tech specialty center offers services

Stacy Bradshaw, coordinator for the Center of Teaching and Learning Technology, fielded a couple of questions for The Tomahawk Times about the technologically advanced specialty center at Matoaca High School – Chesterfield County Public School System, VSU-FBLA Region. There are numerous services offered to students of the Technology Specialty Center.

“The specialty center offers students the opportunity to take classes that are technology rich,” stated Bradshaw. “Students are required to take at least one IT (Information Technology) class every year, and they typically follow a track of programming, computer graphics, hardware/software specialization, etc.”

All students that are in this program receive a county issued laptop.

You might wonder how technology would help you even if you don't pursue a career that is related to technology, but jobs that some might not imagine to be technologically related, actually are.

“Auto mechanics have to use computers to diagnose a car's problem,” explained Bradshaw. “Delivery people use technology to track and deliver packages. Doctors use robots and programmed machines in surgery.” With these reasons, it is now clear to see how much of an impact technology has on our daily lives.

Students enrolled in this center obtain many skills and opportunities.

“The skills/opportunities that students access by being in this specialty center are as follows: familiarity, and in some cases, proficiency in Office Suite (Word, Excel, etc.) and hands-on day-to-day experience using a computer,” stated Bradshaw. She also noted that graduates from Matoaca that go on to college are more “go-to” people for technology questions because of their experience.

Using his experiences as a functionally-illiterate college football player and an illegal drug user, Manley encouraged students to stay true to their dreams.

“My dream was to be a professional football player. I had tunnel vision because I wanted it so much,” he said. “We must continue to have dreams and pursue those dreams.”

In 1986, the football player sought literacy tutoring in Washington, D.C., and has moved forward with his life since then.

“I thought he was good when he talked about being a drug addict,”

Freedom High School sophomore Leon Carter said. “It was inspirational.”

Carter and some of his school’s FBLA members drove an hour and a half to attend the conference.

Other students responded positively to Manley’s advice.

“He did have an interesting look into how you set goals for the future,” James Woods High School junior Tiffany Geisweidt said. “I really liked it.”

In addition to Manley’s speech, Geisweidt, 16, was eager to interact with other students.

“I always look forward to our competition and conferences,” she said. “It [the conference] is very interesting and inspirational. I see everybody here learning and having fun.”

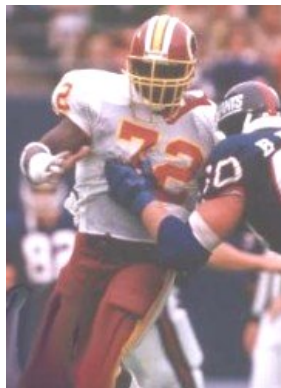
The student business organization’s annual fall conference centers on several hands-on skill and ethics workshops.
